Many people enjoy the experiences of being outdoors and the personal connection with nature. Research shows that anxiety, depression and other mental health issues can be eased by spending time outside nature simply makes us happy.



Recognizing that being outdoors can instantly improve one's physical and mental health, three individual donors gave nearly \$6,000 to help bring the outdoors inside for the residents at The Trinity Community at Beavercreek.

Their donations sponsored natural pieces of art in preserved moss walls that maintain their soft textures, intricate natural details and vibrant colors (with the added bonus of being completely maintenance free). These moss walls in all three resident dining rooms, enhance the resident's dining experience. In addition to promoting positive physical and mental health, they also improve interior air quality because the moss absorbs carbon dioxide and pollutants in the air and reduces noise pollution as they dampen sound.

Health and Wellness Foundation, a new efficiency has been realized with the new FORA mobile Unit Manager Megan Heiney, LPN, stated:

"This system is very helpful to the staff and is extremely user friendly! It gives us easy access to resident charts and is linked directly to PointClick Care, so when entering vitals, the information is uploaded quickly and helps the nurses and STNAs stay on top of charting throughout the day."

Thanks to a generous \$9,700 grant from the Austin-Bailey Health and Wellness Foundation for FORA mobile care systems, staff spend significantly less time checking vital signs and charting and **more time providing direct care and individual attention to the residents.**

RECIPROCAL Giving

Cheerful donors have impacted residents, employees and The Glenwood Community through their **RECIPROCAL Giving.** Residents are grateful for their home, the services provided and the caring staff that serve them daily. Examples of these impactful actions include:

The Glenwood Community Endowment Fund

A desire to create a fund that would support The Glenwood Community in perpetuity was spurred from the advocacy of residents in 2018. Their goal was to raise \$50,000 to initiate the endowment over a five-year period. Just three years later, more than \$100,000 has been raised with residents, employees and family members donating to this legacy fund.

Employee Giving Campaign

Through their giving, staff have helped fund resident programming including activities, art programs, the library fund and Music and Memory. Staff enthusiastically give back every year because they genuinely care. Employees at The Glenwood Community show dedication to the residents in a big way through the Employee Giving Campaign- with 100% of employees donating for the sixth consecutive year in 2021. The campaign slogan notably aligns with the generosity experienced at The Glenwood Community:

Employee Appreciation

Residents eager to demonstrate their gratefulness to the staff that served them so well in 2021, joyfully contributed to the employee appreciation gift distributed annually in December. This generosity has increased every year, with more than \$34,400 given in 2021.

Special Chair Project

A resident who wanted to make an immediate impact at The Glenwood Community to inspire others to give while refreshing their home gave an anonymous gift in spring 2021. As a result, fundraising for new dining room and pub chairs was launched with an anonymous \$15,000 matching gift donation. Residents and family members stepped up, and within three months the \$33,000 fundraising goal for the chairs was met!
